THIRD COMPLAINT OF DISCRIMINATION AGAINST HOUSING

To Whom it May Concern,

This is my 3rd attempt at reporting the DISCRIMINATION I face from Housing. I have just logged onto Home Choice this morning and at discovering nothing has changed I have no choice left but to attempt to report this DISCRIMINATION and now seek legal help.

1. The Law states that the world has to be looked at through my, autistic eyes
2. The Council made a financial investigation into me and decided I could afford 2 beds
3. The Council gave me a two bed house around Christmas time
4. I stated that the only reason was due to the extreme remote location
5. The Council denied this
6. I had to turn the house down for medical reasons
7. I told the Council that, as logic dictated, I could afford that 2 bed I could afford another
8. I told the Council that Home Choice, thusly, had to show me 2 bed properties
9. However, some 9 months later that is still not the case
10. What is worse is that I see I have TWO bids in on other houses
11. Given that the Council has
 - 11.1. Decided not to get to know my autistic impairments
 - 11.2. Have ignored me asking for Council autistic support
 - 11.3. Decided not to involve their own autistic support team
 - 11.4. How is it possible that they know what properties to bid on?

There is no one more publicly discriminated against than a White, Male, Middle Aged, Educated. I have seen how people of colour and people of a non-evolutionary sexual persuasion get to display their disgust at not being recognised for whom they are.

However, if I do anything other than write a politely worded letter, such as this, I get unfair labels attached to me - if I ever make the mistake of displaying the emotion one feels when one is disallowed to be who they are... the Council will label me adversely and then use that against me.

Given that I came to the Council under Safeguarding Conditions, and that the Council have no interest in that, even to the point of actively blocking me from accessing Safeguarding, I spend each day in a kind of living terror.

Terror that Council people will randomly turn up like they did during the summer, not listen to anything I had to say - only to both give verbal disbelief when I tried to explain what being autistic means.
